Lord Crisp is an independent crossbench member of the UK House of Lords. He was Chief Executive of the NHS and Permanent Secretary of the UK Department of Health from 2000 to 2006. He has subsequently

worked in low- and middle-income countries in Africa and Asia. Lord Crisp also founded the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Global Health and the global campaign on nursing, 'Nursing Now'.

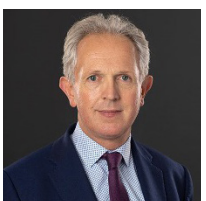
Dr Francis Omaswa, Founder and Executive Director of the African Centre for Global Health and Social Transformation (ACHEST)

as being a member of the strategic council in Independent Healthcare Providers Network.

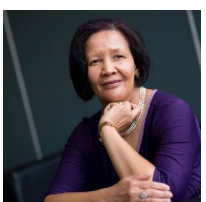
Maureen Mahoney, Director General (People Management), Ministry for Health, Malta
